Victorian Disability Awards



The Victorian Disability Awards are awards that are given to people.

An award is a prize for good work.



When a person gets an award they know that other people like what they have done.



The Victorian Disability Awards are prizes for people who

have a disability



• make life better for people with disability



• live in Victoria.



We run the awards.



The awards can be given to

• 1 person



• a small group of people



• a large group of people.



You can **nominate** a person or group of people to win an award.

Nominate means you tell us who should win the award.



You can help us find a winner for 8 awards.

Important dates



Nominations

• start on Tuesday 29 March 2022



and

• finish on Tuesday 3 May 2022.



We will tell people who might win an award in June 2022.



People who might win an award need to fill in a police check consent form.



A police check consent form means that you say **yes** to us doing a **police check**.

A police check means the police check that someone is **not** a criminal.




The finished police check consent form must be sent to us in 1 week.






A **finalist** is someone who might win an award.

We will **announce** the finalists in June 2022.



Announce means that we will tell everyone.

We will announce the award winners in August 2022 at a **ceremony**.



A ceremony is a special event.

Award for an emerging leader



An **emerging leader** is a person who is starting to

• show other people how to do things

and



• help other people to do things.



The award is for 1 person.



You can nominate a person who

 is starting to tell others what people with disability need or want



 is starting a new program to make life better for people with disability.

Award for excellence in creating inclusive communities




Excellence means to be great.




Your **community** is the people and places around you.



An **inclusive community** means everyone is a part of the community.



To feel included in a community you need to feel that you belong and are important.



This award is for a person or group of people.



You can nominate a person or group of people who have made your community more inclusive. For example, they might



- make buildings or places better for people with disability
- help more people understand disability.



Award for excellence in employment outcomes

Employment is when you work in a job.





This award is for a person or group of people.



You can nominate a person or group of people that have helped people with disability to

start work

or



• keep their paid job.



You can also nominate a person or group of people who have made work places better for people with disability.

Award for excellence in promoting health or housing or wellbeing



Your health means you

- feel well
- do **not** feel sick.



Housing is where you live.



Wellbeing is how happy you are with your life.





This award is for a person or group of people.



You can nominate a person or group of people who help people with disability to

be healthy



- be happy
- get a good home.

Award for excellence in promoting rights or fairness or safety



Rights are things that everyone should be able to

- get
- have
- do.



When something is fair it is the same for everyone.



When you are safe you should **not** get hurt by people or things around you.





This award is for a person or group of people.



You can nominate a person or group of people who help people with disability to

- know their rights
- get their rights
- be safe.

Volunteer award



A volunteer

• works to help people

and



• is **not** paid money.



There are many volunteers who help make Victoria a better place for people with disability.





This award is for a volunteer or group of volunteers who help people with disability.

Excellence in promoting disability pride



Disability pride means you are a person with disability who is proud of who you are.





This award is for a person or group of people.



You can nominate a person or group who make people with disability feel good about themselves.




You might nominate someone who

- speaks in public about life with a disability
- fights for disability rights
- changes how people think about disability.

Lifetime achievement honour roll



This award is for a person who has helped people with disability for a long time.



An honour roll is a list of names.

The new winner of the award is added to the honour roll every year.

How we choose the winners



The judges

• talk about the nominations




• choose who will win each award.



When the judges choose the winners they think about

achievement

what has been done to help people with a disability



• impact

how the achievement helps people with disability



 other information that will help them choose the winners.




How to nominate for the awards

There are rules for the awards.

You might need help to understand the rules.




1. Read this information



2. Choose who you want to nominate

If you want to nominate someone who works for a large group you need to tell their boss.

Their boss has to tell you it is ok to nominate the person or group of people.



3. Tell us your details

You need to tell us

- who you are
- who you want to nominate.

4. Write about your nomination



Tell us why the person or group of people you nominate should win.

When you write about your nomination you tell the judges about the person or group.

You should **not** write more than 900 words.




Your computer will tell you how many words you have written.
